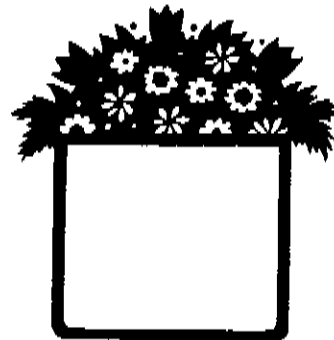
Did You Know?

That Park Hills was mostly uninhabited in the late 1800s. The land was too hilly for farms and too inaccessible for homes. Only a few homes existed along what is now Dixie Highway. Devou Park came into being in 1910 when William Devou donated 500 acres of nonproductive land adjacent to his farm. The development of Park Hills began in the 1920s when the Lee, Simmons and Billiter families bought land and began to layout streets. In 1927 a charter was granted to incorporate the city and Park Hills was founded.
