MEMORIAL DAY 2005: A TIME TO REFLECT

Time and Place: Monday, May 30th, at 11:30 AM marks the date and start time of the annual Park Hills Memorial Day Parade, sponsored by the City of Park Hills and the Park Hills Civic Association. Annual activities include the Garden Club's bake sale, the parade, and flag raising ceremonies. The theme for the parade and flag raising ceremony this year is: "Memorial Day: A Time to Reflect." *The Parade forms at 10:30am, off Dixie Highway in Park Hills at the Covington Campus of Northern Kentucky University (Some of you remember it as the Chase Law School Campus).*

Parade Lineup and Assistance begins at 10:30am: Similar to the parade lineup over the last several years, there will be a number of Parade Officials to assist you in finding your row and lineup number. The Parade Officials are located at the top of the hill at the entrance to the University/School parking lot. Please use the road to the University parking lot off Dixie Highway, across from Ft. Mitchell Garage. **NOTE: Please do not use Mt. Allan Road, as it creates a traffic tie-up in the parking lot.**

Parade Route and Entries: The Parade starts promptly at 11:30am, and follows Mt. Allan to South Arlington, to Dixie Highway, to St. James, to Old State Road, to

Terrace Drive, to Amsterdam Road, to Rose Circle, and concludes at Park Drive. (See page 3 for map) Parade entries include our elected City, County, and State officials, floats, convertibles, military vehicles and personnel, antique cars, The Dixie High School Marching Colonels, Jack Shoemaker's Stationary Marching Band, community groups, horses, school youth and sport groups, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cubs Scouts and Brownies, local music groups, gymnastic clubs, and lots of neighborhood entries.

Flag Raising Ceremony: At the conclusion of the parade, a flag raising ceremony will be conducted at Trolley Park, at the intersection of Amsterdam Road and Park Drive. A flag that has flown over our nation's capitol will be presented to the City by State Representatives Jon Draud and Arnold Simpson, and flower displays will be placed at the base of the commemorative markers honoring the Park Hills residents who have given their lives in war. Kenton County Judge Executive Ralph Drees will lead the ceremonies with the Pledge of Allegiance.

He makes my Mom smile when he says "It's time to earn my paycheck." I really never thought about it then my brother walked in with his T-shirt on. It says "Freedom isn't Free."

I'm proud to know my brother is willing to pay the price.

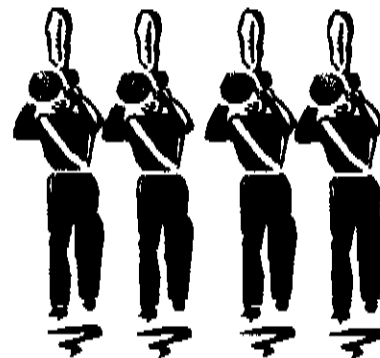
Garden Club Bake Sale:

Summer is near. It officially begins on June 21 and we are all eager to feel its warmth. Thanks to the generosity of the **Maler Family and Architectural Products Company**, Trolley Park will be graced by two unique planters. These beautifully crafted spheres will be supported by a single column and will give the illusion of a hovering ball of blooms. They will be a signature addition to our park. It is our hope to add a small grove of trees to the park to provide shade and fall color. Trees are an investment in the future. They require patience, space and water. In return they provide shade, oxygen, noise reduction, erosion control and even pollution abatement.

Angel Santos of Park Hills, a **PHD in Botany and professor at University of Kentucky**, has assisted us in creating a watering system for the common areas in the Trolley Park area and Park Drive boulevard. He has donated the time for planning and installation of an environmentally friendly, solar operated drip system. We thank him for his expertise in this endeavor in which our only expense was the cost of the physical product.

As the days lengthen and we spend more time enjoying the outdoors, it is important to be aware of possible hazards which lurk in the yard. If you would like a list of poisonous plants common to our area, please contact Elizabeth Muske at muskefam5@fuse.net or myself and we will forward a list to you, along with the parts of the plants that are poisonous.

These plants are hazardous to humans and pets. The local poison control center can advise on care in the event of contact with these plants. Just because you see a bird eat it do not assume that it is safe for a person. Children are especially attracted to berries such as those borne by the yew and holly. Poison Ivy should be aggressively dealt with in early summer before it becomes too vigorous. Various chemical applications are available which are most effective in eliminating this miserable plant. Seek and destroy it in your yard before it ruins a child's summer. It can also be contracted by pets and it can be transferred by pets to humans.

Enjoy the summer and take time to see the beauty in flowers, friends and family.

Foxglove -- leaves, seeds
Ground Ivy -- all parts
Holly -- leaves, especially berries
Horse Chestnut -- flowers, young sprouts, nuts
Hyacinth -- bulbs
Hydrangea -- leaves, bulbs
Iris -- bulb, leaves, stems
Jack-in-the-Pulpit -- all parts
Jequirity Bean -- bean (chewed)
Jerusalem Cherry -- leaves, unripe fruit
Jessamine -- all parts
Jimson Weed -- all parts

Kentucky Coffee Tree -- seeds

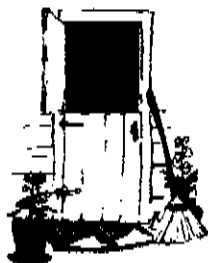

correct Web address. You should never email personal or financial information. Email is not a secure method of transmitting personal information. If you initiate a transaction at a company's web site and want to provide your personal or financial information, look for indicators that the site is secure. A secure site has a pad lock icon on the browser's status bar and the website's address will begin with "https:" (the "s" stands for "secure"). Unfortunately, no indicator is foolproof: some phishers have developed ways to forge security icons. You should also review credit card and bank account statements as soon as you receive them to determine whether there are any unauthorized charges. If your statement is late by more than a couple of days, call your credit card company or bank to confirm your billing address and account balances.

If you use Internet Explorer, you can take some steps to protect yourself from phishing scams. In the Internet options, set the security level to high for the "Internet" zone. This disables ActiveX support which is what phishers use to exploit weaknesses in Internet Explorer. You can also install a free toolbar that help defend against phishing websites. They are available at: www.webroot.com/products/phishnet, www.trustwatch.com, www.fraudeliminator.com, and www.earthlink.net/earthlinktoolbar.

If you respond to phishing e-mails, and input the requested financial or personal information into e-mails, websites, or pop-up windows, you may be putting your accounts and financial status at risk in three significant ways: First, phishers can use the data to access existing accounts and withdraw money or buy expensive merchandise or services. Second, phishers can use the data to open new bank or credit card accounts in your name, and use the new accounts to cash bogus checks or buy merchandise. Phishers normally open those new accounts with a different billing address. So, you may not realize that you have become a victim of identity theft until you are contacted by creditors or until you check your credit report. Third, some recent phishing schemes have involved the use of computer viruses and spyware to spread the phishing e-mails to still more people.

If you get a phishing email, forward it to spam@ucc.gov, uce@ftc.gov, and reportphishing@antiphishing.org. If you are a victim of identity theft, file your complaint at www.ftc.gov, and then visit the FTC's Identity Theft Web site at www.consumer.gov/idtheft to learn how to minimize your risk of damage from ID theft.
